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# Why Do Cats... Hate Travel?

Take a cat out of his comfort zone, and you'll soon *both* be uncomfortable. Cats disdain being "out of their element."

But why is travel or moving so traumatizing for a creature that's generally so confident?

- Cats are extremely territorial, and your home is your cat's turf. Kitties understand the world as divided into territories, each owned by a cat who may not appreciate intruders. Drop your cat into a new environment – the car, the vet's office, your new apartment – and she won't be sure whose turf she's trampling. When she hides, your cat is preemptively protecting herself from the unknown "owner" of this unfamiliar territory.
- Unlike dogs, who hunt in packs throughout a large territory (and who often enjoy travel), cats are <u>solitary</u> <u>hunters</u> who each command and understand a small, well-defined turf. For your cat, the "adventure" of leaving her known world is not fun or exciting – it's seen as dangerous.

- Whoever first said "knowledge is power" was thinking like a cat. Your kitty takes great comfort in knowing every inch of her environment. If it's known, it's home.
- "Cause and effect" is a system your cat understands. Most cats have not been delighted by what they find after being put in a car, carrier or strange new room – and those unpleasant experiences linger in their memories. But, positive reinforcement <u>can help</u>. If your cat learns that travel can lead to terrific things, he will be less likely to fight it tooth and nail.
- We well-meaning humans may unintentionally "tell" our cats that new situations are scary. What tone of voice do you use when comforting your kitten on the way to the vet? If we respond in a pitiful tone (as we may be inclined), we're reinforcing that the car ride or new situation is, indeed, a tragedy. Talking to our cats in our usual voice can reassure them that this is a safe experience.

## Monitoring Your Cat's Health: What To Look For At Home

Our cats are more than our friends; they are our charges. Since they cannot talk, it can be hard to know when they're ill. But below are some things to watch for at home.

**Change in energy level:** If your cat is sleepier and less playful than normal, and doesn't do his typical behaviors (like greeting you at the door), this may be a sign that he isn't feeling well. On the other hand, some diseases, most notably hyper-thyroidism, can cause a **marked in-crease in energy.** Common symptoms are howling or pacing at night.

**Change in appetite:** This is easiest to monitor if your cat is fed at specific times. If you leave food

out all day, your cat may miss a few meals before you notice. Surprisingly, some diseases, most commonly hyperthyroidism and diabetes, can cause a **significant increase in appetite.** 

**Weight loss:** Gradual weight loss can be difficult to appreciate at home, so it is a good idea to have an accurate scale to monitor weight.

**Change in grooming habits** can be a sign of systemic disease. Arthritis, dental disease and myriad other conditions may cause a cat to stop grooming as well as usual. On the other hand, skin allergies may make your cat overgroom her coat or even pull out her hair.

Frequent or chronic vomiting or diarrhea: I don't worry about vomiting, as long as it is occasional and not associated with loss of weight or appetite. If these symptoms occur together, however, consult with your vet.

Drinking or urinating excessively can be a symptom of diabetes, kidney problems, or hyperthyroidism. If you notice that you have to refill your cat's water bowl more frequently, his litter box is soaked, or his clumps of litter are larger than usual, a vet visit is in order.

Straining to urinate or defecate, crying when eliminating, or eliminating outside the litter box can be symptoms of constipation, diarrhea, or urinary tract problems. <u>Straining to urinate</u> without producing urine can be an indication of a cat with a urinary blockage, a life-threatening situation that

requires immediate veterinary attention.

Crying while eating, difficulty chewing, dropping food, hypersalivation, and bad breath can be symptoms of oral pain. Dental disease is very common in cats and can be quite painful.

Ultimately, you are the person who knows your cat best. "Normal" behaviors vary from one cat to the next. Some cats are very energetic, or never miss a meal, while others are finicky, or more laid-back. Any change in your cat's normal behaviors may be a harbinger of problems.

If you have concerns about your cat's health, a visit to your veterinarian may help to lead to an early diagnosis of a problem, or may alleviate your concern when the doctor pronounces your cat in the best of health.
